My passion has always, and will always, be education. Not simply universal education, but high-quality education.

One of the beauties of St Jude's is the academic resources available to students and teachers: outfitted science labs for practical learning and computer labs with the most updated technology. Ms Pendo Jeremiah, curriculum deputy and chemistry teacher at Smith Secondary Campus, believes these resources are what make St Jude's an institution of higher learning. "Learning science subjects through practical stimulates students to arouse interest and helps students tackle problems which might occur in their environment." Ms Pendo earned her bachelors degree in science from the University of Dar es Salaam, and has been a member of staff at St Jude's since 2010. Aside from teaching chemistry to the Form 4 students, she oversees all of the academic elements of the school. It's because of leaders like Ms Pendo that St. Jude's is in such an excellent position for our future!



LEARNING THROUGH EXCURSIONS









At St Jude's, students also learn both in and outside the classroom. Secondary students recently ventured to the Cultural Heritage Centre, where they soaked in the Tanzanian, African and international artwork. Students also took a trip to the Selian Agricultural Research Institute where researchers educated them about crosshybridization and gene mutation in growing maize.






THE JOYS OF SPONSORSHIP

CREATIVE INSPIRATION FROM LOCAL AUTHOR



IRENE'S BIG DREAMS FOR HER FUTURE



NEWS FROM THE EAST AFRICA FUND

IN THE BEGINNING...

It all started in 1999 when Gemma Sisia asked some Australian friends to set aside \$5 each month to help children in East Africa gain an education. Gemma's initial vision was to send the money to Uganda to assist just one student to attend school there. As the funds grew, Gemma's dad, a solicitor, convinced her that her 'East African project' should be set on firm legal foundations and he helped her set up a registered charity called 'The East African Fund Incorporated.'

GROWING PAINS....

Gemma was finding that the money being sent to Uganda was not finding its way to the children, so she decided the best way to make sure the money was properly utilised was to go to East Africa herself and build a school. The School of St Jude opened in the village of Moshono, near Arusha in Tanzania in January 2002. Initially, the funds being kept safe in the East African Fund Inc weren't sufficient to build the classrooms needed.

ROTARY GETS INVOLVED....

Australian Rotarians got behind the project, not just by travelling to Moshono and building classrooms but also with Rotary acting as an auspice to offer tax deductibility to Australian donors. Today all donations by Australians and on the website go first to the East African Fund, then to Rotary Australia Worldwide Community Service (RAWCS) and finally to the school.

SO WHAT EXACTLY IS THE EAF?

The fund is an incorporated association registered in NSW, Australia, and meets all legal and fiduciary requirements. It continues to collect money from Australian individuals and corporations to assist the development of people in East Africa. No money is received from government, while fundraising expenses amount to less than 2% of all proceeds collected. From those humble beginnings in 1999, the East African Fund now provides over 90% of the funds for St Jude's. St Jude's is EAF's only project, although thanks to the wisdom and foresight of Gemma's dad, it has the flexibility to support other East African projects if needed in the future.
