Form 2 Students Excel

St Jude's has a mission to educate and mentor well-rounded students who are ready to elevate themselves and their community from poverty. Our teaching methods allow for students to embrace their creativity and focus on critical, creative thinking. Our teachers facilitate the learning process daily, witnessing first hand how engaging, articulate and dedicated the students are becoming. To see this translated on a national scale is equally impressive.

In the recently released Form 2 National Exam scores, St Jude's once again shined. Our students, those currently in Form 3, placed 2nd out of 341 schools in the North West Zone. This class scored the highest average of any previous St Jude's class to sit for the Form 2 Exam, with a mark of 82 percent. All of the 132 students passed the exam, an achievement considering 35.45 percent of students nation wide failed. In the North West Zone, our students placed 1st in ICT, a particular point of joy for our staff, where students are taught computer skills as early as Year 1.

Although exam scores are not the "be all and end all" of an education, they are important indicators of how we are progressing. Academic staff can then focus on particular subjects that we can improve on. Over the past three years, scores in Civics, Geography, Kiswahili, English, Physics and Biology have never been higher than this year. The level of progression is inspiring and a testament to our academic staff who continue the tremendous job of facilitating the learning process for their students.

By the way things are looking, 2013 is off to a fantastic start. We can't wait to see what's next!

As a student in Std 2 last year, Consolata scored straight A's in all of her subjects: English, Maths, Kiswahili, Science, Computing, Vocational Skills and Religion. What's even more impressive is that she did this for all three academic terms, which is a remarkable achievement for anybody at any grade level.

Highly motivated and highly engaging, Consolata is a bright girl who comes from a family that has never had many material possessions. She lives with her mother and father, who both sell washing powder for a living, and her younger sister in the urban Mianzini village. The four of them share a two-room house with no electricity and shared facilities with other tenants.

Consolata is still unsponsored, but she continues to make the most of her education.



"I hope that on completion of the A-Level the students will achieve a firm foundation for future success both in further education and beyond," Mr Revocatus says. "Also, to be able to work more independently, be more responsible and be more confident."

For the past two years he has been a Maths and ICT teacher at St Jude's, and has previously worked in the USA and South Africa. Mr Revocatus is an extremely talented individual who still needs sponsoring.

Global Immersion and St Jude's—Summiting Great Heights Together!

Summiting Mount Kilimanjaro is an extraordinary accomplishment for anyone – it's one of the tallest mountains in the world and can be the most mentally and physically exhausting treks for even the most experienced of climbers. It's also becomingly increasingly more expensive to climb, as it draws in thousands of tourists every year. For a majority of Tanzanian people, it's simply too much money to spend when there are hungry mouths to feed. So when Tanzanian's have the opportunity to climb Mt Kilimanjaro, it should not be missed. Thanks to the fantastic support from Bernie Kelly and Global Immersion, five of our secondary students and the secondary school headmaster were asked to climb Mt Kili. Along with the Global Immersion, every single person reached Uhuru Peak, standing 5,895m at the highest point in Africa. Over seven days our team battled the elements, braving freezing temperatures, altitude sickness and everything else Kili had to throw at them.

The entire school is so proud of them! To witness the mental fortitude and determination of five of our students to push themselves to accomplish a goal, we're all in awe of their spirit. It's inspiring for their peers to know what they're all capable of inside. As for Mr Rasul, St Jude's secondary school headmaster, led by example, showing his students that no challenge is too difficult if you put your mind to it.

What's included in the June tour?

If you've ever visited St Jude's and were given a tour of the Sisia or Smith Campuses, chances are a jovial Tanzanian man named Felix guided you in and out of the classrooms, around the playgrounds and sat with you in the outdoor dining hall. If not, you're bound to have met him, as he's the first person you see when entering our offices.

Felix has been a member of the St Jude's family for the past eight years, first starting out as a bus driver with little grasp of the English language. Determined to work in the administration office someday, Felix would practice his English with the students while he drove them to and from St Jude's everyday.

"I remember when I was driving a bus some of the students would give me homework, because I was trying to talk to them in English, but my English was very poor," Felix says. "They tried to correct me and I was really reading the papers they gave me, so the next day I would not make the same mistake again."

After working four years as a bus driver, Felix improved his English enough that it landed him a spot in the Visitor Team. He's not only become one of the most recognizable and beloved faces at St Jude's, but he's developed computer skills and an eye for improving visitor relations with the hundreds of guests who visit St Jude's every year.

"St Jude's has really changed my life," Felix says. "My English has improved and I'm very happy to work in the office."

Through hard work and a will to achieve his goals, Felix has become a role model to the students and a cherished friend and colleague to the staff.

Felix is from the Massai tribe and lives with his wife Nembris and their two beautiful daughters, Emily (pictured) and Abigail.

St Jude's Kids Give Back to Their Community

Community service has always been an important aspect of St Jude's. As the school has grown, it has become increasingly important to give back in any way possible. Staff and students head out into the neighboring villages to donate food, clothes and other items. A byproduct of this service is the relationships St Jude's has built with other organizations. Two recent donations to government schools in our area saw student donate sports equipment and computers.

In coordination with the IT department, St Jude's visited Shangarao Government School to donate two refurbished computers. St Jude's fantastic resources allows our students to use some of the most up-to-date technology, so older equipment can be passed along to school's and organizations who have never had them before. In addition, students gave sports equipment including soccer balls to a local government school. The students there will now enjoy having equipment to play with during their breaks.

Through these experiences, students not only learn the importance of community service, but it furthers St Jude's commitment to the people and community who have supported us over the past decade. "We trust that over the duration of an individuals schooling at St Jude's, we will nurture responsible, well educated citizens who will make a lasting contribution to the community and to their country."

Liston's Big Dreams Are Closer than Ever

Since joining St Jude's in 2004, Liston has progressed through each grade with a zeal and determination that has made him one of the most creative students on campus. In 2012 he built his own mobile phone from scratch, which earned him a prize in a science competition. In 2013, he's in the process of building his own generator.

"When I observed the environment, it is not impressive," Liston says. "I'm thinking of having another type of fuel that can replace fossil fuels that are not environmentally friendly. First, I built an internal combustion engine and now I have to find the alternative fuel."

It comes with no surprise that Liston placed first out of 132 St Jude's students in last year's Form 2 national exams. He's an incredibly motivated individual who would like to attend tertiary education and then open his own workshop to build and fix mechanical and electrical machines.
