Message from Jon Ford, School Director

As I wrote for the newsletter last month I was looking forward to St Jude's Day when staff dress-up in St Jude's kangas as part of the celebration. My wife, Sandra, made me a graduation outfit with hood and mortar board. After a whole school photograph (try to imagine organising 1,660 students aged from 6– 20 into a single photo) we celebrated mass in what was a beautiful service. The School Choir was magnificent and I found it moving to see students who have so little themselves bringing gifts to be distributed to others who are in need. It has been great to see our Form 4 students taking their National end of Secondary exams - their so called "O" levels. The name comes from England where I took my "O" levels in 1976. The "O" actually stands for Ordinary Level as opposed to Advanced Level or "A" level - I remember thinking that ordinary was not really a fair description as I found that they were actually pretty hard exams and that remains true to this day.

I asked one Form 4 student what he would do in his holiday time and he said he would continue to study to prepare for Form 5. I asked if he would do some tuition for other children in his village and he looked surprised that I asked and replied, "Of course I will, I already do when I am at home." This is part of the "Ripple Effect" of St Jude's.

Last week we welcomed members of the Board of the East African Fund to St Jude's for a series of meetings with The School of St Jude Ltd and stakeholders throughout the school including students, academic leaders and parents' committee representatives. Great discussions were had and more news of the plans that came from those meetings will be announced in due course but we are all excited about this new phase in the development of our fight to tackle poverty through education and create leaders for the future of Tanzania.

Finally I would like to say a special thanks to Shean Gannon who has been here for three years and the last two as Acting School Director as well as Business Manager. We said farewell to him last weekend as he flew home to Australia. His impact on the school has been immeasurable and as someone accurately said to me, he is a hard act to follow. I am grateful that he has been here to offer me advice and support over the last three months and I am reassured that all his wisdom, experience and knowledge is only an email or skype call away. The School of St Jude will miss him and will remain grateful for all he did in his time here. To borrow one of Gemma's favorite phrases, "Good on you Shean!"

Rebel Wilson talks about her ongoing commitment to St Jude's

The Australian actress who has risen to fame in *Bridesmaids* and *Pitch Perfect* is a very loyal supporter of St Jude's, sponsoring a student and a boarding room. We asked Rebel a few questions.

What inspired you to get involved in The School of St Jude?

I first saw a documentary on ABC about the school, and I just thought it was such an amazing idea and Gemma was really inspiring. I, myself, was a Rotary International Youth Ambassador and lived in South Africa for one year. During that time I got to travel to rural areas in Swaziland, Malawi, and Mozambique. I visited villages where the kids had no education or resources. I was lucky enough to have a brilliant education, and I think that St Jude's is offering kids who never have any education a chance to learn and grow into leaders of tomorrow.

What do you like about being a St Jude's sponsor?

I like that my donations are going directly to helping individuals at the school. I have been sponsoring Winnie for a number of years and I love receiving her letters and now e-mails. I think the school does a great job in sending through your sponsor child's school reports and a photo when you send packages to your sponsor child.

What advice would you give to St Jude's students who have come from adverse backgrounds and are now making strides in their education and deciding what to do beyond secondary school? Education is your key to opportunity. I know I come from Australia, but I didn't grow up with much. I just believed in myself and tried to always improve. My advice would be to try your absolute hardest at school. Study hard and try different activities so that when you finish secondary school there will be lots of opportunities for you to pursue. Even though I now work in the entertainment industry and get to make people laugh; when I was at school I tried hard in all my subjects and my final exam results got me into the top law school in Australia. When it comes time to decide what to do with your life I would say choose what you're passionate about and then work out a way to profit from that. Becoming an actress was the most risky path I could have taken, but its been such a fun path and the risk has more than paid off.

Why is philanthropy important to you?

Now that I am in a fortunate position it feels good to give back. I think the work that St Jude does is important and amazing, and I am so happy to support the school. I look forward to visiting in person in the future.

Creative Writers Win Big

We're extremely proud of two of our secondary students who have performed well in national writing competitions.

Wenseslaus, a Form 3 student, won third place in the International Youth Day Essay Competition run by the African Leadership Academy, a Johannesburg-based institution providing leadership programs for secondary students. He was the only Tanzanian among the winners.

For the competition, students were required to write an essay of up to 1,000 words about the topic: "How can governments, businesses, non-profits, individuals and the youth collaborate to maximize Africa's youth potential for the continent's development and prosperity?" According to the African Leadership Academy, "259 young people from across 20 countries in Africa, including two Africans living in the United Kingdom and the Czech Republic participated in the competition."

In his essay, Wenseslaus identified five major areas that need to be developed in order for youth to have a chance: providing quality education and vocational skills; teaching science and technology, including empowering women to study scientific subjects; creating jobs; making books and digital technology available to youth; and providing business and student loans. "We have to start trusting youth and give them a chance to show their worth," wrote the St Jude's student.

Meanwhile, another Form 3 student Ebenezer made the top 10 in the 2013 Standards Day Essay Competition for his essay on the topic of 'Standards ensure positive change.' In his essay, Ebenezer wrote about how standards ensure expertise in the world and enable people to become experts in various fields such as engineering, information and communication technology, electronics and other fields.

There were around 200 entries in the competition and 46 came from St Jude's. Ebenezer and a friend were taken to Dar es Salaam for the award ceremony and although he didn't get one of the major prizes, he was awarded a merit certificate and prize money. He says he plans to use the money to enlarge his chicken house so he can keep more chickens.

"We are so proud of their achievements," says Jon Ford, School Director at St Jude's. "It shows we are on track to meet our goal of educating future generations of leaders in Tanzania."

Our students love creating amazing pieces using everyday objects and learning more about traditional forms of African art, including Tinga Tinga. Nurturing their talent is our gifted Upper Primary art teacher Mr Kephas. He lives and breathes art and thrives when he is sharing his knowledge with his students.

Mr Kephas started teaching at St Jude's earlier this year and the walls and spaces in his room are filled with the students' colourful art pieces. He is proud to display them because it represents his passion. "I feel art living within me. The pupils are so talented and are keen to learn new skills in different subjects, extra curricular and other areas. They're ready to be leaders of tomorrow," said Mr Kephas.

He often likes to inspire the children in his classes by showing them art and artists from around the world. Mr Kephas cites one of his main goals is to help the talented children to reach their dreams. He hopes for more specialist art colleges in East Africa for budding young artists and also for art studies to be more prominent in Tanzanian schools. "I want to advise the government to introduce art and design in A-level," he said.

Away from school, you can find Mr Kephas in his studio at home creating his next art piece. Someday, he aspires to become a professor in art and design.

Nuhu is one of Mr Kephas' art students who really enjoys learning. He is in Standard Six and has been studying at St Jude's since 2008. He is a strong student who has passed all of his subjects last term with flying colours. Sadly, Nuhu's mother passed away when he was young and he is looked after by his father, grandfather and grandmother. They live at Ngongongare near Arusha where his father works as a casual labourer and his grandparents are farmers. They don't earn much and they have a little farm, called a 'shamba', where they grow their own produce like maize, potatoes, vegetables and fruit for them to eat.

Nuhu is studying hard so he can one day help support himself and his family. His favourite animal is the cow because it gives his family milk and meat. Nuhu's favourite subjects are science and maths and he has his heart set on becoming an engineer or doctor one day. "It's because in Tanzania, these jobs don't have many workers," he said.

St Jude's Day

Almost 2000 people attended St Jude's on 25 October, to mark the feast day of Saint Jude, who is the patron saint of hopeless causes. Gemma named the school after the saint as she set about developing the school over 10 years ago.

The day was also about giving thanks as well as celebration. The students brought in small gifts ranging from eggs and other goods to be distributed to local orphanages and hospitals. St Jude's students value their education and we teach them about the importance of giving back to the community.

Students did creative dances, raps and performances on the day. All of the students come from impoverished backgrounds and the school has been a lifeline to them and their families who see education as key to fighting poverty. "I like the presentations. It means a lot because it has helped me. Without St Jude's, I couldn't get an education," said Frank, a Form 1 student. Students also did creative dances, raps and performances on the day. "It was a celebration enjoyed by all students. It was great to celebrate mass with them and hear the wonderful singing by the choir in a mixture of Swahili and English," said Jon Ford, St Jude's School Director.

The school has enriched the lives of many, from its students to its staff and volunteers. "St Jude's Day is very important as what we're doing is something inspiring. We are helping children whose lives are affected by poverty to be able to get a good education," said Firmin Kiwale, Head of Religion and Vocational Skills at the Smith Secondary Campus. St Jude's also handed one of its longserving volunteers, Shean Gannon, a graduation certificate and gown to acknowledge his outstanding contribution to the school over the past three years.

A best dressed competition for most creative use of the St Jude's kanga was held at the event and the school's much loved drivers won for the third year in a row. Well done drivers!
